Reviving Strings Education in Anacortes

In 2023, I met a fiercely enthusiastic woman with an infectious smile named Barbara Baker. She might be the most persuasive person I've ever met. She came to AMP with a clear mission: to bring strings back to Anacortes. First, she wanted Friday morning lesson space with Dr. Michael Wheatley, conductor of the Skagit Symphony. Next, the idea of a children's strings camp was born, Barbara, herself a symphony musician, had a vision. With school budget cuts and strings programs gone, she knew the time was right to rekindle our community's connection to the wild and wonderful world of strings!

me and said, "I know you guys have rock camp and that's very cool, but I want kids to know — strings are cool too!!" Now, hearing a cello plugged in or catching tears from a moving ensemble performance. I know what she means. Seriously — strings ARE cool!

Barbara led the charge, AMP was on board, and pretty soon we were off and running with strings camp planning. Barbara spearheaded meetings and communications, crafted the syllabus, designed the entertainment and games, and rallied the volunteers. With only a few months between conception and launch, she seized momentum. grabbing a vendor booth at Shipwreck Fest to promote the camp. She hauled a range of stringed instruments downtown so kids could touch, explore, and play. It was scorching hot that day, but Barbara never lost her smile. Her delight at every child's curiosity was impossible to miss.

I'll never forget the time Barbara looked at Even though, according to Barbara, she wasn't a "natural" violinist, she worked hard every day to play her own finicky French violin. Violins must be played to keep them in good condition and her own dedication to daily playing mirrored everything she hoped to instill in the kiddos.

> Sadly, in June 2023, about two months before the first Overture Strings Camp. Barbara received a diagnosis of stage four pancreatic cancer. The doctors wanted to begin chemotherapy immediately, but not Barbara. She told them, "I've got strings camp in August — I'll start chemo after that." She delayed treatment because she believed in the mission that much. Her dedication was admirable and inspiring.

> What drove Barbara to launch the first Strings Camp in Anacortes? She often said that her lifelong love of the violin sprang from growing up in Wenatchee, Washing

ton, where school-based strings programs A Legacy Gift: The Violin Endowment shaped her from grade school. She played in different symphonies throughout her life — Saratoga, Beaverton, Skagit — and felt strongly about giving Anacortes kids the same opportunity. She also volunteered in the Tualatin school system south of Portland, where a friend taught music. There, she gained the spirit of her approach — handson, heartfelt, and encouraging.

Barbara loved watching children discover their first notes. She modeled every lesson, standing close, guiding a finger or bow, showing them. No lecturing, just loving mentorship. Olive Rankin, now a veteran violin player and strings camper, attended the first camp in 2023 and said, "She was a teacher that took her time learning how to work with students and she always gave positive feedback, but also told me what I needed to work on."

Parents, teachers, and the Skagit Symphony rallied behind the camp and were surprised at how quickly things came together. With seven campers the first year. Barbara took that as proof: "There is a need here." She was right — nineteen students enrolled in 2024, and the momentum is still going for 2025.

"If we can generate the necessary pieces for a kid to go from the very introduction of the instrument to playing in a youth symphony, that is what will produce lifetime players. By the time you get to symphony level, you are hooked. And that's what I think we're doing, and I'm going to make sure that we have the means to continue to do it."—DARREL BAKER

AMP now offers private lessons with Skagit Symphony player, Suellen Eberhart and group violin lessons will start again in the fall. We still have openings for the third annual youth Overture Strings Camp in August and you can register on our website.

After Barbara's death in 2024, her husband, Darrel, took custody of her cherished late-1800s French violin with the vision to sell it and create an endowment in her memory dedicated to sustaining strings education in Anacortes. He said, "That is precisely why I'm doing it, to honor Barbara and what she believed in. Supporting strings education ensures her contribution lives on."

Skagit Symphony Concertmaster, Dr. David Benson, played the violin temporarily, then symphony member Sarah Carter bought it, with the goal of keeping it within the Skagit Symphony. At 74, Sarah plans for the violin to pass to Benson when she retires playing. Darrel says, "It staying in the symphony feels right — I think Barbara would be on board with that." He shared that they took out a second mortgage to acquire the instrument, decades ago, believing that a quality violin would empower her. Now it will empower generations of future young musicians.

Barbara taught us that playing a stringed instrument involves courage, joy, and community. She brought strings back to Anacortes with passion, grit, and an unshakable belief in every child's potential. The endowment, named "Barbara Baker, Strings of the Future" ensures her legacy will carry on. With the momentum she started, Barbara's vision for lifelong string players is now settled into our town's story.

Her fight, her smile, her steadfast dedication, even in the face of cancer, showed us what it means to create something bigger than ourselves. Today, the strings sing in Anacortes for her. And because of Barbara, they'll continue to sing for generations to come. •

How did this project come together? You all have spent time in other local bands, what makes this different than your other bands?

This band is different from our other bands, Tolman Creek and Seraphic, because we started the band as friends. Unlike the other bands, we had all known each other for some time and over that time had realized that we work very well together. It was only natural that we formed Dead Nettle.

What are some of your musical influences. and how do they shape your sound? Do you all bring a little different spice when it comes to this project?

Our musical influences are all over the place. Ultimately, we all compromised onto a softer rock sound, taking influences from bands like Letters to Cleo, Belly, and the Cardigans. We all, of course, add our own flair to our music, from Jadon's funky bass lines, to Eva's grungy guitar riffs.

Can you describe your creative process when writing and producing songs? What's the secret sauce that makes a Dead Nettle song?

We owe our writing process almost entirely to our front-woman Eva. The songs we have put together come from her personal experiences, and her creative mind. While the rhythm section adds their own personal touch to the sound, the center of it all is our lead guitarist and vocalist.

Are there any particular themes or messages you aim to convey through your music?

Eva talks on our upcoming EP, "Originally two of the songs, 'Lilac Bed' and the self-titled 'Dead Nettle' were about an ex of mine, but now I've kind of changed the meaning because well, he's an ex now. So yeah"

What challenges have you faced as a band. and how have you overcome them?

We're very lucky to have not faced any significant problems with this project vet, we are pretty new still but we're ready to face any challenges that arise.

Any memorable experiences or highlights from your journey as a band so far?

We were afforded the opportunity to record with Steve Drizos down in Portland not too long ago, it was truly a great experience. We recorded five tracks and learned a lot about the recording process.

What can fans expect from Dead Nettle in the future? Did I hear correctly that you have a SWAMP show coming up?

Our upcoming EP of course! It's called death metal and we're so excited to release it! We also have a few shows coming up including a SWAMP show with Nurhachi on August 8th and a Live from the Snug show at AMP with Elliot Tercero on August 21st.

How would you say AMP shaped your musical journey as a band? Is there anything you would like to tell the peeps at AMP?

We all met at AMP, so of course AMP means a lot to us as a band. The AMP community has been nothing but supportive and inspiring to all of us and we're so grateful to have access to a space where we can express ourselves creatively.

Jadon, you recently played your first Shipwreck Music Fest. Can you tell the readers what that experience was like for you?

Jadon says, "With Huk behind the mixer and Bradyn's drum set under my butt, it was one of the best experiences I've had performing!"

What advice would you give to aspiring musicians who look up to you?

Get out there and do what you want to do. All it takes is a committed mind or two to form a great project.

A recent AHS graduate who works in many mediums, our August cover artist has exciting plans for the future. With college ahead and a summer full of homebuilding and camping, he took a moment to tell us a little bit about himself and his artwork.

Congratulations on graduating! Do you have any fun adventures planned for the summer? What's coming up next for you?

I am using my summer before college to explore the PNW by camping at Lower Lewis Falls, Pacific City, and Ross Lake. This fall I will be attending the University of Washington as a freshman in the College of Engineering, where I will pursue a degree in mechanical engineering. I'm looking forward to getting involved in research projects on the cutting edge of robotics and mechanics, and meeting people who share the same passion for creation and learning.

What is your connection to Anacortes?

I am the third generation of my family to live on Guemes Island. Growing up in Anacortes, I've been fortunate to be surrounded by a deeply supportive community. What stands out most is the generosity of skilled mentors who've shared their time, insight, and encouragement — people I'll carry with me and stay connected to for life.

Tell us a little about yourself as an artist.

Drawing has always been a small hobby of mine since I was a kid, but the first structured drawing class I took was in high school.

During my freshman and sophomore years, I took Drawing I & II. Although I've been drawing for a while, my interest in digital media and graphic design didn't start until my senior year. I have a background in construction, design, and fabrication, so most of my art is sculptural, architectural, or functional: modern coffee tables, lost wax castings, jewelry boxes, charcuterie boards, kitchen knives, and two handcrafted electric guitars (one in the shape of Guemes Island). Working on engineering, woods, and metals projects gave me exposure to 3D modeling programs, which helped me pick up tools like Photoshop for digital art a bit more easily.

I'm impressed that you already work in so many mediums. In addition to making electric quitars, do you also play quitar?

Yes! I started playing guitar in fifth grade, inspired by my teacher Mr. Rozema, who played guitar for the class regularly. I started playing at school talent shows and at the Guemes Island Store for open mic nights. I began the process of making the Guemes guitar at some point in early middle school, but set it aside because of a large mistake. During the first semester of my junior year, I picked the project back up with more experience in woodworking, and finished it. In my next semester, I started working on the red Gibson Les Paul style guitar. I fully designed, 3D modeled, and fabricated the guitar in the AHS woodshop. Unfortunately, my last few years have been so focused on school and building my house with my father — by far my largest project — that playing music has taken a back seat for now. However, listening to music definitely does play a role when I'm doing creative work. I'm always listening to music while I work and I find great enjoyment in trading songs with my dad and girlfriend.

Tell us about this piece on the cover.

My work on August's cover of Show Chime is inspired by the stalks of foxgloves that grow outside my bedroom window. There have always been foxgloves in my family's gardens. The towering stems and bright blossoms of foxgloves in the spring and summer are an inspiring symbol of growth, transformation, and bright success, which resonates with me as I enter my next stage of life. •

The Lonely Forest

The Lonely Forest was an Anacortes band that was active from 2005-2014, and attained a high level of success outside of Skagit Valley. The band was comprised of John Van Deusen, Eric Sturgeon, Braydn Krueger, and Tony Ruland, all of whom still live in Anacortes.

The Lonely Forest released four full length albums and two EPs, toured, appeared on Jimmy Kimmel Live, played at Bonnaroo and other big festivals, and had songs featured on MTV.

Their sound was melodic, slightly poppy rock, akin to Death Cab For Cutie, Minus the Bear, or The Cave Singers (not the writer's comparisons).

I highly recommend their album We Sing the Body Electric, the name of which stems from Ray Bradbury's novel I Sing the Body Electric, which in turn stems from a Walt Whitman poem of the same name.
